Let Us Not Forget

Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May. It was formally known as Decoration Day and

commemorates all men and women, who have died in military service for the United States.

It is traditional to fly the flag of the United States at half mast from dawn until noon. Many people visit cemeteries and memorials, particularly to honor those who have died in military service. Many volunteers place an American flag on each grave in national cemeteries.

Memorial Day started as an event to honor Union soldiers, who had died during the American Civil War. It was inspired by the way people in the Southern states honored their dead. After World War I, it was extended to include all men and women, who died in any war or military action.

The current name for this day did not come into use until after World War II. Decoration Day and then Memorial Day used to be held on May 30, regardless of the day of the week, on which it fell. In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed as part of a move to use federal holidays to create three-day weekends. This meant that that, from 1971, Memorial Day holiday has been officially observed on the last Monday in May.

Let us not forget those who have served, those who continue to serve, and those who have died in military service for our country!

Guest Speaker for May's Meeting MG Janet E. A. Hicks

Maj. Gen. Hicks, the post's first female commanding general, is currently in charge of Augusta Preparatory Day School's Upper School.

MGen. Janet Hicks's original career goal more than two decades ago didn't include becoming Fort Gordon's first female commander. In fact, she said she was more interested in getting out of Iowa and seeing the world. MGen. Hicks made her way through the ranks of the Signal Corps, first as a student at Fort Gordon, then an instructor at the post and from 1999 to 2000, its Chief of Staff, before making her way to Camp H.M. Smith in Hawaii as the Director of Command, Control, Communications and Computer Systems.

At the time of her nomination to major general, MGen. Hicks was one of 14 female generals in the Army and one of three commanding a major installation.

**National Security
by LTC David Titus**

A veteran pentagon official brings perspectives and expertise to current and future challenges relating to National Security. Kathleen Troia "KT" McFarland, FOX News national security analyst and host of Fox News traces her defense and national security experience back through three presidents. This Q and A from ROA's *The Officer* is very enlightening and will be presented in installments.

Q: Looking back at your career, you served in multiple positions in the Department of Defense during the Reagan Administration into 1985, following some lean years of defense spending. ROA's executive director talks about being a Marine in the 1970s and having to yell "bang bang" as he ran through a training exercise because of limits on ammunition. Explain, from your experience, your view of attempts to cut defense spending and how are they similar to what you may have experienced when you first arrived at the Department of Defense.

A: What happened after Vietnam -- it was an unpopular war and, unfortunately as a nation, we blamed the military. We cut the military, we claimed a peace dividend, but I think tragically; we cut back on the pay and medical benefits of military, particularly our wounded warriors and our veterans. So when we came into the Reagan administration -- when I came into the Pentagon -- we were stunned at what we saw. We had ships that couldn't sail because there was no fuel; we had airplanes that couldn't fly because our pilots lacked the requisite number of training hours to be qualified; for every tank we had that we could use, there was on sitting right next to it that would cannibalize for spare parts. And the greatest tragedy was that we saw the men and women -- our veterans-- who were not receiving adequate (mental and physical) care.

And we even had some of our junior enlisted personnel who qualified for food stamps, because they didn't make enough in salary, and yet these were the people who had given so much of themselves -- put their lives on the line for the country -- and the country forgot about them. I think it was a great tragedy for those people, but it was a great strain on the soul of America. And my concern is that we're heading in that direction once again. To be continued

Vets health care exempt from sequestration cuts

Funding for veterans' health care programs is not subject to sequestration, the White House budget office announced Monday, ending months of speculation about how across-the-board budget cuts could be applied early next year if Congress cannot find a way to avoid fiscal disaster. Sequestration, looming because Congress and the White House failed to reach an agreement on a 10-year, \$1.2 trillion deficit reduction plan, also will not cut veterans' benefits, leaving only administrative expenses of the Veterans Affairs Department potentially subject to reductions, according to legal opinion issued Monday by the White House's Office of Management and Budget. The announcement came in a letter to the Government Accountability Office, which had asked the White House for clarification about the automatic cuts' effect on VA. The Budget Control Act of 2011, which set up mechanism for cutting federal programs if a deficit spending agreement wasn't reached, specifically exempted veterans' benefits but had no clear statement about what might happen to veterans' medical care expenses. Sen. Patty Murray, D-Wash., the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee chairwoman and the Senate's chief negotiator last year in the attempt to get an agreement on cutting federal spending, said she is "pleased that this legal ambiguity has been cleared up."

Murray said during negotiations with the House, "I can remember fighting for this exception as one area we cannot afford to cut back on."

While the letter clarifies the situation for veterans' programs, the fate of military benefits remains unclear. The Budget Control Act allows, but does not require, the Defense Department to shield all military personnel programs from sequestration. It appears the military would face a cut of about \$57 billion, roughly 18 percent for each account, under sequestration. If personnel programs are exempt, the Defense Department would still have to save \$57 billion, and would be forced to just make deeper cuts in other programs.

Defense Department officials have not said what they intend to do.

Sen. Graham Calls Free Lifetime Health Care Promise a "Myth"

Military columnist Tom Philpott reports a telephone interview with Sen. Lindsay Graham (R-SC), the ranking member of the Senate Armed Services personnel subcommittee.

Philpott reports that Graham bluntly said, "TRICARE premiums have to be adjusted. Between now and the end of the fiscal year, I hope we can convince the House to accept some adjustments in premiums for TRICARE." According to Philpott's report, Graham also said, "I don't believe anybody was promised free lifetime medical care. That's a popular myth." Graham continued, "There was never any contract with anybody that, for the rest of your life, you will get free medical care. That's not part of the deal and was never part of the deal."

It appears that Ranking Member Graham and Subcommittee Chairman Sen. Jim Webb (D-VA), who has stated opposition to the increases, might have a lively time when the subject comes before their panel in late May. An Air Force Reserve lawyer like Sen. Graham should be more informed about health care history in the military, as he will be eligible for TRICARE when he turns 60.

House Committee Votes Against TRICARE Increases

The House Armed Services Subcommittee on Personnel met to markup and forward recommendations on its portion of the National Defense Authorization Act. Some of the provisions approved include:

- Authorize a troop pay increase of 1.7% and extend bonuses and special pay for our men and women in uniform
- Limit end strength reductions for the active Army and Marine Corps
- Provide significant new regulations and procedures for combating and prosecuting sexual assault within the military
- Extend access to family housing for six months and Commissary and Exchange benefits for two years for troops who are involuntarily separated.
- Extend some TRICARE benefits to members of the Selected Reserves who are involuntarily separated.
- Make clear that non-monetary contributions to health care benefits made by our troops and their families through a career of service to America represents pre-payment of health care premiums in retirement.

Not included were the enormous TRICARE increases proposed by DoD.

In Section 701 of the subcommittee's plan for TRICARE, the Chairman expresses the Sense of Congress "that career members of the uniformed services and their families endure unique and extraordinary demands and make extraordinary sacrifices over the course of a military career and those decades of sacrifice constitute a significant pre-paid premium for health care during a career member's retirement that is over and above what the member pays with money."

There's a long way to go before the Pentagon's plan to steeply increase TRICARE fees is defeated. While it appears the House side may do the right thing the Senate is an entirely different story. We know that Sen. Jim Webb (D-VA), chairman of the Senate personnel subcommittee,

is working to hold the line, others Senators see TRICARE increases as part of this year's initiative. Sen. Graham calls "Free Lifetime Medical Care a "Myth." This year Chairman McKeon has stated he is against the increases and we want to ensure that he remembers his statements on not allowing any massive TRICARE increases.

We still needs your help. Until the plan is buried, it could still happen. Continue your calls and messages to your Representative and Senators. Tell them it's a moral contract. Let them know that shifting the cost of your promised health care breaks faith with those who served. Ask your family, friends and neighbors to get involved. Keep sending the emails

Memorial Day

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in our nation's service. There are many stories as to its actual beginnings, with over two dozen cities and towns laying claim to being the birthplace of Memorial Day. There is also evidence that organized women's groups in the South

were decorating graves before the end of the Civil War. While Waterloo, NY, was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day. It is more likely that it had many separate beginnings; each of those towns and every planned or spontaneous gathering of people to honor the war dead in the 1860s tapped into the general human need to honor our dead

Beware Scam Letter from DFAS

A letter is making the internet purporting to be from DFAS asking military member's fiancées to register in the DFAX system entitling them to benefits in the event of the member's death, all for only a \$350 fee. This is a scam. Please let your fellow Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines and families know the score. DFAS Corporate Communications advises the Facebook post links to an earlier release DFAS put out back in October on interaction with customers -- DFAS will never send you unsolicited email messages requesting your myPay login ID and password or any other personal or financial information. DFAS also will not send you unsolicited email messages with attachments. Military Alphabet

What do the words "MIKE" and "X-RAY" have in common?

They are the only words in The Military phonetic alphabet that have not changed over the years. A phonetic alphabet is a list of words used to identify letters in a message transmitted by radio or telephone. Spoken words from an approved list are substituted for letters. For example, the word "MOWW" would be "Mike Oscar Whiskey Whiskey" when spelled in the phonetic alphabet.

This practice helps to prevent confusion between similar sounding letters, such as "m" and "n", and to clarify communications that may be garbled during transmission. The words chosen to represent some letters have changed since the phonetic alphabet was introduced. When these changes occur, they are made by international agreement. The current phonetic alphabet was adopted in 1957.
